Reflection

Beauty in All Creation

“Glorify the Lord, O chill and cold,
drops of dew and flakes of snow.
Frost and cold, ice and sleet, glorify
the Lord, praise him and highly exalt
him forever.” BCP page 88

Winter here in southeastern Ohio can bring with it all the things mentioned above: chill, cold, dew, snow, frost, ice, and sleet. Often these elements of winter can impede whatever activities we want or need to engage in: getting to class or work, to the store, a friend’s house, an important medical appointment. This can make it difficult for us to recognize the beauty of these elements, perceiving them as bad.



The words above come from a prayer in the Book of Common Prayer called A Song of Creation reminds us what makes something beautiful isn’t our opinion of them. What makes creation, all of creation, beautiful is it was made by God and by it’s being, even if that being is icy and cold, it gives glory to God.

To embody this message, I will be placing these rocks painted with winter images outside the church near the sidewalk. I’ve been placing painted rocks by the sidewalk since the start of the fall semester. One side has a picture the other side are words from either the prayer book, Bible, or other spiritual book. On the back of these rocks are messages reminding us of the beauty of winter. Perhaps they will brighten someone’s day.

As we come to the end of January with wintery days certain to come, perhaps we all could use the reminder each season has its own beauty and taking time to look for that beauty is one way we can - as the prayer above says - praise God.

Reflection on the January 2023 Vestry Meeting

(Repeated from last week.)

The first vestry meeting of the new year is the last for the vestry that was voted in by the parish at last year's annual meeting and this provides an opportunity to express appreciation for the vestry members whose term expires.

There were considerable conversations to engage in. In addition to approving the budget that the Treasurer and Finance Committee have been working hard on for over two months, the vestry had a guest from Diocesan staff.

The Rev. Michael Ralf, Missioner to the Southeastern Region of the Diocese, joined the first hour of the vestry meeting to speak to some of the rector and vestry's concerns about how to respond to decline. Fr. Michael comforted us to say we are not alone in what we are experiencing. Parishes all over the diocese and nation are struggling with the same concerns we are. To help us he made two suggestions:

1) He invited us (the parish) to participate in a discernment/visioning process with a professional consultant who has worked in both the corporate and religious sectors. This process will last several months and will be FREE, as the diocese received a grant for this ministry. The purpose of this process would be to help us adapt to the changes in our community.

2) He invited us to consider an additional means of getting income to supplement our deficit budget by creating a partnership with a neighboring Episcopal parish seeking a more consistent priestly presence. This partnership would entail the sharing of Good Shepherd's priest, for which the partnering parish would pay Good Shepherd. To get the funds to pay Good Shepherd, the partnering parish would write grant requests from the diocese.

The vestry was eager to accept the first invitation, as they could see how it will be helpful to have someone with a different perspective help us evaluate our parish, the current situation, and identify potential opportunities we might

be missing.

The second invitation will require more prayerful thought and consideration, as it is much more complex and involves another group of people. For the sake of respectful privacy, we are not publishing the name of the potential partner until that parish has been formerly approached. For now, the vestry is willing to meet with the vestry of the potential partner to have an exploratory conversation.

While neither suggestion is an obvious long-term solution, the exploration of both is the type of work many parishes will have to engage in as society continues to evolve to be more secular and the way we have always “done church” will need to adapt. This is not the first time this type of change has happened. Remember several years ago our Lenten study focused on the Great Emergence, the historical observation that every five hundred years a shift happens where society goes through a process of deconstructing its values and emerges changed from what it learned from the process of deconstruction. Episcopal scholar Phyllis Tickle wrote several books this process and went on extensive speaking tours to try to educate and encourage us through this process which is painful but there is hope. We are living into what she predicted. The bad news is this period of deconstruction will most likely last longer than any of our lifetimes (over a hundred years). The good news is the world, the church, and civilization has gone through this process before and survived. Some institutions changed, think of the Great Reformation and how it impacted the Roman Catholic Church five hundred years ago, but they survived. New things will emerge from this time, much like the Anglican Church, from which the Episcopal Church emerged, came to be five hundred years ago.

It is important to remember as we prayerfully consider exploring the invitation from Fr. Michael Ralf and the diocese, we do so with curiosity and resist the temptation to think we know how it will work out. When there is uncertainty, there is temptation to replace it with what we think we know. This is how misinformation can spread. Instead, let’s be prayerful. Let’s be curious. Let’s be on the lookout for the Holy Spirit and what God is calling us to in this time. While it is a difficult time, it is the time we are living in, and no matter the time we live in, as followers of Jesus Christ, we can look to him for our stability, and remember our call to live God’s Kingdom of Heaven as best we can in whatever time we are in, however that might look.

Practicing Compassion

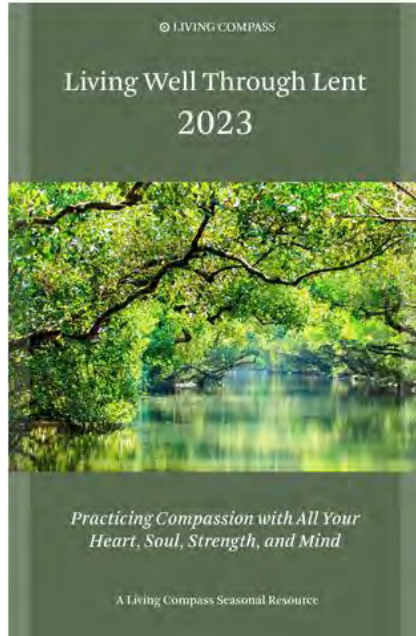
"In order to prepare for the new life of Easter, we need to be intentional about discerning what it truly means to practice compassion with our whole being." – the Rev. Scott Stoner
