In the Interim . . .

Dear People of Good Shepherd:

At its October meeting, the Vestry made an important decision concerning how we will spend some of our time during the interim period. That decision involved establishing a Task Group to help us understand better who we are as a parish and discern where our future might lie. The Vestry and I began talking about such an activity this summer and at that time I wrote substantially the following:

Discerning Good Shepherd's Future: Exploring Identity, Identifying Mission

The interim period provides one of the most opportune times for a congregation to explore its identity and discern its future. We know we are in a time of change and there is more openness to talk about "who we are and where we're going."

The term "discern" is used intentionally in the above title; it is a theological and spiritual term appropriate to the perspective of a religious, Christian people. In secular culture the process in which we would participate is called **planning**. When one *plans* one "decides" how to shape one's future. However, in a Christian context, church members **discern** what God is "saying," is "doing," what God is "up to" within the history and personality of a particular people. Church members **listen** for what God is "calling" that people to do as part of God's mission in the world. This perspective recognizes that it is not "our ministry" in which we are engaged, but "Christ's ministry" in which we participate.

Some of the marks of a discernment approach include: a constant "searching" attitude which is open to discovery; calm, reflective thinking; "waiting," e.g. "for surprise," for "connections," rather than forcing a decision; a lot of listening and watching; and, of course, prayer – prayer and prayer exercises in Vestry and other working bodies, and the daily prayer of our members.

The process will begin following the Annual Meeting in January and should in large part be completed in June with the setting of priorities. Steps include:

- form a Vision Discernment Task Group (November); it will
- meet with the Vestry and assess the congregation's ministry (January);

- reflect on the congregations' history *in a congregational meeting* (February);
- identify congregational norms *in a congregational meeting* (March);
- interview key people in the Athens/OU community (April);
- prioritize goals with the Vestry (May);
- share and shape priorities at *a congregational meeting* and begin to ...
- develop a mission statement (June).

The Vestry will form the Vision Discernment Task Group at its November meeting. It will be looking for persons who meet the criteria set out in the above paragraph beginning "Some marks of a discernment approach..." If you would like to recommend persons to serve this Task Group, please speak to me or any Vestry member.

Senior Warden Comments

On October 5th, I celebrated my 54th birthday by attending a Choral Matins service at St. David's Cathedral near the Pembrokeshire coast in Wales with my husband, John, and son Carl. Two days before that we had happened into this magnificent cathedral in the late afternoon, just in time for Choral Evensong and their harvest festival celebration. Lucky is how I would describe us. I thought about the story of the disciples wanting to set up tents on the mountainside where they had such a perfect time with Jesus, not wanting to go back to the general humdrum of life. Very tempting to want to stay and keep things just as they are when you're have a real peak experience, isn't it?

I got back to Athens just in time to be at Good Shepherd for the Blessing of the Animals. Actually, I had the opportunity to sing alongside Patch Jupin (Jack Russell terrier of our Interim) for the recessional hymn. Talk about a blending of voices. I also made it back to Athens in time to go to the October Vestry Meeting. You can read the Vestry Highlights I wrote in this newsletter. Lots of highlights, lots of things are happening here at Good Shepherd. Then, I had the opportunity to take part in the Annual Fall Flea Market. I call this the true and ongoing miracle of Good Shepherd. Miracle that so much money can come from all of those second hand fleas AND miracle that the Marthas still speak to each other afterwards. I would like to report that continuing the sale the next day (Sunday) was a good idea. Many parishioners left with bags of treasures. A spin-off special was that the Marthas sold sloppy joes and chilidogs during Coffee Hour. You may see this kind of casual lunch opportunity after church again sometime.

Our Diocesan Convention is coming up November 14th. You will note that of the resolutions to be presented is one concerning increasing funding for ministry to young people on college campuses throughout the Diocese. One of the presenters of this proposed resolution is our own Interim, Michael Jupin. Thank you, Michael.

Perhaps some others have been having this similar experience. Yesterday an e-mail from my sister-in-law in Gainesville, Florida, arrived which described events in the Episcopal Churches in her own city. St. Michael's, the parish who supported my family so strongly during the illness and death of my brother, is breaking away from the National Church and joining a separate Anglican Group. Another, Holy Trinity, has aligned itself with the National Church. Meanwhile this particular Diocese has been denied use of the Catholic Cathedral in Jacksonville

for the ordination of a Bishop. The Presiding Bishop has cancelled his plans to come to Florida. All of these events are apparently the results of strong reactions to the General Convention action. She says that of all of her years as an Episcopalian she has never witnessed such division. Two women friends of hers were ordained as priests in the time when that was still a new kind of event and even that, she says, did not create this kind of uproar.

I feel fortunate that we are in a community that supports diversity, where our own Betty Larson can voice her opinion in *The Athens Messenger* announcing that our Church of the Good Shepherd is a family that can work out its differences. Let's continue to pray for open hearts and minds.

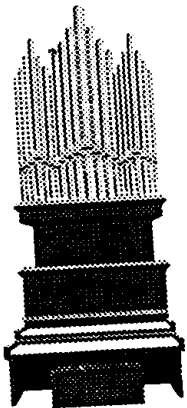
Revised Rehearsal Schedule:

Vestry Highlights

- Opening with a time of prayer, sharing, reading from Scripture, and reflection is an important facet of Vestry meetings these days.
- In the Treasurer's Report it was noted that we have not had to use any of the Endowment money so far this year.
- A brief report about the Every Member Canvass was given in which Vestry was told that of the pledges that are in, there is a 6% increase in giving. We are losing some members who will be moving, but the good news is that we have 5 new pledges.
- Preston Denton told of the Financial Seminar, led by Archdeacon Hanisian, which he, Ann Rathbun, and Michael Jupin attended at Procter Conference Center. The churches invited to attend were ones of our size and smaller, who like us, work to keep going despite small numbers of pledges. He found it helpful to talk with others who are in similar circumstances.
- Laura Reams, our new Peer Minister, reported on the activities she has begun for students from middle school on up. November 16th this group will be presenting a chancel drama, which will be in place of a sermon that Sunday. Meetings and rehearsals are underway. On the Canterbury front, invitations are being extended to about 25 students to attend a gathering in the Hobson Lounge where there will be a light supper served followed by discussion.
- Interim Ministry Review: The terms of this review are spelled out in the Letter of Agreement between Good Shepherd and Interim Michael Jupin. Evaluations sent out to Vestry members by the Senior Warden were filled out and the responses were reviewed and discussed. The prescribed tasks for evaluation are derived from this statement: "The major goal of the Interim Priest's ministry is to prepare the congregation for the coming of the next rector."

1. How has the Interim helped the congregation deal with its grief and any other unresolved issues arising from the rector's departure?

Responses favorably pointed towards Cottage Gatherings, one-on-one meetings with the Interim, and the general positive and welcoming spirit as being helpful. Vestry members suggested that there are still unresolved issues of grief and hurt which need to be addressed through the help of our Interim.

2. How has the Interim helped us deal with internal conflicts and help heal any divisions within the congregation?

Actions listed as helpful were the Interim's workshops on the Congregation as an Emotional System, policy of openness, meeting with groups in conflict to examine the history and finding a resolution. Suggestions: a ceremony/service of forgiveness/reunion, more calls to those in conflict. Summing it up rather well, one Vestry member said, "Not everything is completely healed but it's not getting worse."

3. Has the Interim helped to align parish life and administration with generally accepted standards of the diocese?

Michael Jupin has invited us to participate in Diocesan events such as the Money Seminar, and he regularly forwards items from The Episcopal News Service to keep us in tune with the National Church. It is suggested that we have more participation in Diocesan events.

4. How has the Interim assisted us in maintaining the worship and life of the parish in these categories: working with lay leaders to maintain regular worship service schedule, preaching, education, pastoral care, calling upon the sick and shut-in, and ongoing administration of the parish?

The general response of Vestry to these topics was overwhelmingly positive. "Our Interim has taken on each of these and turned Good Shepherd around." When asked what needs improvement a member commented "greater participation/vision" from us all. "The Vestry seems re-energized in its mission."

- The last portion of October's Vestry Meeting had to do with our commitment to a specific program of discerning our church's future. An explanation of this will be found in our interim's column.

November: Taking Root, Spreading Wings, Celebrating Liturgy and Music in the Episcopal Tradition

November 2nd, All Saints' Sunday: At 10:30 a.m. we will celebrate a Medieval Mass as it might have looked at Salisbury Cathedral in the 15th Century. The celebration is followed by a potluck and "talk back" on the experience.

November 22nd – 23rd A weekend with Dr. Walter R. Bouman, this year's diocesan Theologian in Residence (sponsored by the diocesan Faith in Life Committee). Walter will be with us for a Saturday workshop and on Sunday to preach and lead the Adult Education Hour at 9:00 a.m. The theme:

THE EUCHARIST & THE MISSION OF THE CHURCH

Saturday, November 22nd, Workshop led by Dr. Bouman, 9:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.: Describing this workshop Dr. Bouman writes: "The Church began as a messianic movement within Judaism. The disciples of Jesus understood themselves to be caught up in Jesus' own messianic mission: living witness to the Reign of God. We will address why the meal was the earliest element of being Christian to achieve fixed form; how our liturgy today resembles that of the earliest Christian communities; how Jesus is present in the meal; what we offer and how we are taken up into Jesus' mission; what it means to offer ourselves into the service of the Reign of God." Sign up begins in Church on November 2nd or by calling the church office. A box lunch (from Baker Center Catering) will be offered at a cost of \$10.

Dr. Walter R. Bouman has been on the faculty of Trinity Lutheran Seminary, Columbus, since 1978, became Edward C. Fendt Professor of Systematic Theology in 1983, and is *Emeritus* in that chair since his retirement two years ago. He was a visiting professor at The General Theological Seminary, 1994 – 95 and served on the committee that helped bring about full communion of the Episcopal Church and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America. He is author of a number of books including *What Shall I Say? Discerning God's Call to Ministry*, *The New Church Debate*, and *Christianity American Style*.
