# All Saints' Sunday

November 4

All Hallows', better known as All Saints', Day is November 1. The Book of Common Prayer classifies All Saints' Day as a Principal Feast Day, which means that it is a day as important for the church year as Christmas and Easter. A Principal Feast takes precedence over any other day or observance. There are 7 Principal Feasts in the church year: Easter Day, Ascension Day, the Day of Pentecost, Trinity Sunday, All Saints' Day, Christmas Day, and The Epiphany. Of all the Principal Feast Days, only one can be observed on the Sunday following its date; that one special Principal Feast is All Saints' Day (BCP page 15). All Saints' Day is the time the Church gives us to honor those who have gone before us, and especially to remember those who have helped build up and contribute to the church in their lifetimes and are now part of the company in heaven. One way we can remember and honor those who have helped build up the church in the past is our presence and participation in the church in our present day.

# Gospel

## All Saints Sunday

John 11:32-44



When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see." Jesus began to weep. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

## **NAMI Athens Speaker Series** (Today, Nov. 1)

**A Survivor Speaks on the Psychological Impact of Childhood Incest -- Dr. Nan Mykel** The trauma inflicted on her when she was a victim of incest in early childhood drove the life of this now eighty-three-year-old woman. Arming herself with a Ph.D. in Psychology, Nan Mykel would go on to create and, for many years, run a program for sex offenders at the Hocking Correctional Facility in Nelsonville. In 2014, she published *Fallout: A Survivor Talks to Incest Offenders*.

In this informal setting, Dr. Mykel hopes to share the impact intergenerational incest has had on her as well as what she has learned about protecting children from incest and other forms of molestation. ## How I Used The Rector's Discretionary Fund as a Bridge

A routine visit to the vet for one of our cat's yearly checkup and vaccinations on my day off this week turned into an unexpected moment when, thanks to your generosity, I was able to help someone in distress.

When we arrived for our cat Elwood's appointment, we noticed that the parking lot was unusually full, and so was the waiting room. The folks who were waiting with us were very talkative, and we had a lovely conversation, especially since their cat had cancer, and you might remember we lost a cat to cancer early this year. It is a beautiful moment when strangers share a connection, even a sad one, because it somehow changes strangers into something friendly. As we waited, I noticed a young couple who kept coming and going from one of the examination rooms with distressed looks on their faces, and I assumed the reason we were waiting longer than usual was that there was an emergency.

As people and their pets came out of the other examination rooms, they asked the couple how they were and how their dog was with such compassion and empathy I couldn't help but be impressed.

Indeed here was an emergency, and the people who happened to have appointments at the vet that day were forming a little community of love and empathy for a young couple whose dog had been in a bad accident. I could not help overhearing that the dog had a badly broken leg that required surgery. I also could not help overhearing that the surgery was going to be expensive and the couple could not afford to pay for it. I saw looks of sadness on the faces of the other people in the room, and powerlessness, that feeling of wanting to help but not knowing how.

It was at that point we were called in for Elwood's checkup, so we got up and went into the examination room, but my heart and my mind were not in that moment. I thought of the times in my life when I have been in that place where I did not have the money for what was needed, and how in those moments someone helped me out and gave me what I needed. They gave me more than money; they empowered me to do what needed to be done in emergencies or tough situations. They gave me peace and hope.

It turns out I had my discretionary fund check book in my purse. And thanks to your generosity and that we haven't had many recent calls asking for utility assistance, I had several months' worth of discretionary Sunday deposits in the account. So I left Michael to handle Elwood's checkup and went to the couple, who were on the phone trying to get a loan to pay for their dog's surgery, with tears in

their eyes, and told them I wanted to help.

At first they didn't seem to believe me, so I explained I am a priest at a local church and I have a special fund for situations like this and I wanted to use that fund to help them, to make sure the surgery is paid for so they didn't have to make a decision about a dog they love based on whether or not they could afford the surgery. Then they accepted, although they seemed to have a hard time believing anyone would do what I was doing for them.

As I wrote the check to the vet, the couple asked my name again, even though I had introduced myself earlier. And I told them again. They asked what church I am from, and I told them. I asked them to tell me their dog's name, and they told me so much more than that about how this dog had been a part of their life together. When I took my leave, there were hugs all around, and the tears seems to have dried, and I felt that they were experiencing hope. Now they could move forward with the important decisions they had to make for their dog.

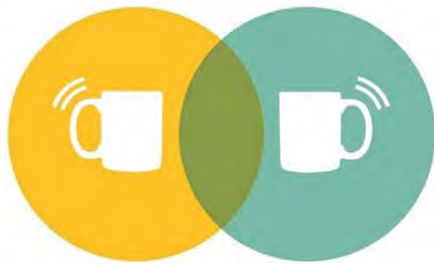
It occurred to me later that this couple is probably very different from me in lots of ways, and maybe different from all of you. But there is one thing that makes us less strangers and more friends, and that is the love we have for our pets. It's another way love bridges many gaps, and that is God With Us.

The day made me extremely grateful for the many people who have helped me when I've needed it. And while I have not been able to repay their generosity (they have never asked or wanted me to), Monday was an opportunity for me to pay it forward, as I would never have been able to do without the generosity of all of you who have contributed to my discretionary fund. I am so grateful for you! Together, we gave some hope to two people in despair and made the Kingdom of God a little closer to folks who were not expecting it. Thank you for giving me the means to be able to provide what was needed when routine turned into a chance to be community blessed by the Presence of the Love of God. I am so very grateful for you!
