



February 11, Last Sunday in Epiphany

This Sunday is the last time we gather for worship before the season of Lent begins. It is a day when we read about Jesus' being transfigured on top of a mountain and consider how we reflect the light of Christ to the world. Since Lent is a season of fasting and penitence, the last Sunday in Epiphany is the last festive Sunday service until Easter. We'll be burying the word *Alleluia* on Sunday, until it is brought back at the Great Vigil of Easter; since this will be our last chance to say and sing *Alleluia*, the hymns on Sunday will feature the word *alleluia*. Be sure to sing out! There will even be a chance for you to share what *alleluia* means to you. At the end of the 10:30 am service, we will burn the palm branches from last year. Please join us for this full day!

Burying Alleluia

Alleluia comes from the word Hallelujah; it is a word that means "praise ye the Lord." It was intended to be a shout of joy, praise, and gratitude to God. In ancient Israel it was used in liturgical recitation of psalms to encourage participation and was later used in early Christian liturgies. - from the Westminster Dictionary of Theological Terms

Alleluia or Hallelujah has long been a deeply significant term in worship and liturgy in the church. In addition to being an expression of joy, it is also an invitation to

participate in a service by praising and thanking God. It has also been a tradition in the Christian Church to symbolically bury the word on the Sunday before Lent begins as a way to recognize the start of Lent and our faith in the Risen Christ who we believe rose from the dead. This Jesus Christ is the source of our joy, our alleluia. We bury the alleluia not in a spirit of sadness and despair, but instead as a symbolic gesture of hope that in times of trouble when happiness might be hard to find, we trust and hope in the Risen Christ, whose Resurrection we joyfully announce at the Great Vigil of Easter with the return of the word *alleluia*.

There are many ways to "bury alleluias." I've heard of parishes that literally dig a hole in the ground, throw the alleluias in, cover them up, and then dig them up for the Great Vigil of Easter. Since I grew up in Wisconsin, where the ground is usually frozen in Lent and often hasn't fully thawed by Easter, the parish I grew up in put alleluias in a gold box, which was placed in the narthex during Lent to remind us that the alleluias were not to be spoken. I've served a parish with an indoor columbarium, and they had a beautiful golden Alleluia banner that was folded up with great solemnity at the end of the church service on Last Epiphany and processed to the columbarium by the children of the parish, where it sat in an empty niche until the Great Vigil of Easter, when it was processed in during the proclamation that Christ is risen.

This year at Church of Good Shepherd, we are going to bury the alleluias a little differently. This year, each of us will have the opportunity to participate in the burying of the alleluia in a way that is in keeping with the older intention of the use of *alleluia* in the liturgy. Each of us will be given a small piece of yellow paper and a pen at the start of Sunday's service. We will be invited to write the word ALLELUIA on the paper, and on the other side write or draw what represents alleluia to us: people or places for which we are grateful, our source of joy, a prayer, etc. At the end of the service, I will place a wooden box on the table by the door for us all to drop our alleluias into. After the burning of the palm branches, the box will be closed and will remain closed during Lent. The alleluias we put into the box will be brought out and used to proclaim Christ's Resurrection during the Great Vigil of Easter, but SPOILERS, I'm going to make you wait and see exactly how they will be utilized.

As we once again draw near to observing the Season of Lent together, my family and I are grateful to be sharing the journey through another church year with all of you and look forward to sharing in traditions old and new as we grow closer to God and each other.

Last Sunday after the Epiphany

Mark 9:2-9



Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!"

Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.





On February 7 group I fed 57 people 69 servings. The menu was mac & franks and mac & cheese. Salad, fruit, dessert, and beverages were also served.

Book Sale Report -- I have Good News and Bad News regarding our sale of books which you have donated to Good Shepherd

At the moment we have 412 books in stock and we sold 204 books on Amazon in 2017. This means we "turn over" our stock very close to once every two years. Selling on Amazon is in addition to books we sold off the front porch. From these sales we earned a profit of \$1,295.84 in 2017. This is by far the largest portion of our budgeted "Outreach" income and helps support our outreach ministry in the local community. And we would not have sold a single book without your generosity.

The Bad News is that a book can only be sold once. Also for 2018 we are on pace to sell only 183 books on Amazon. This will probably reduce our outreach income by about \$86. I know this is not an astronomical sum of money, but if the trend continues we must either reduce our outreach ministry or find the money to fund it from some other source.

As we know, Jesus turned water into wine, but even Jesus needed water. In the same way I can turn books into gold, but I need books. So please continue donating the books you no longer need to Good Shepherd.
